Minutes of the Annual General Meeting¹ May 26, 2022 1:00 PM – 2:30 PM (MDT)

Hybrid Meeting (Max Bell Auditorium, Banff Centre for the Arts and Creativity & Zoom)

1. Call to Order and Approval of the Agenda (Thomas Willett)

- The meeting was called to Order by CBS President Thomas Willett at 1:00pm
- The motion to approve the Agenda was put forward by Malcolm Xing and seconded by Diego Mantovani. The motion to approve the Agenda as distributed was unanimously carried in-person, with an additional 11 votes in favour from those attending on zoom.

2. Approval of the Minutes from the 2021 AGM, May 14, 2021 (Thomas Willett)

- The Minutes of the 2021 AGM that took place by Zoom was approved by the CBS Board of Directors (BoD) previously. The Board-approved Minutes were then posted on the CBS website on May 19, 2022 for the general membership.
- The motion to adopt the 2021 AGM Minutes was moved by Mark Filiaggi and seconded by Kibret Mequanint. The motion was unanimously carried in-person, with an additional 11 votes in favour from those attending on zoom.

3. President's Report (Thomas Willett)

- Tom shares that although the CBS faced significant challenges this year as we transitioned out of the pandemic, it was pretty successful given the uncertainty.
- Tom thanks Larry Unsworth for organizing a great hybrid meeting this year in Banff.
- The BoD held nine meetings excluding the AGM during the year to conduct the business affairs of CBS.
- The CBS has maintained its student-centered focus through the establishment of the Toronto Student Chapter and sponsorship of two mentorship programs this year. It also sponsored five speakers for the Translational Biomedical Engineering e-Seminar Series run by Houman Savoji (UdeM) and Mohsen Akbari (UVic), as well as sponsored five individuals from industry to attend the annual meeting in Banff.

- The front end of the CBS website was updated, and a new taskforce has been formed to work on content management and updating the backend.
- A new logo has been developed (vote to be held later during the AGM), as well as a CBS LinkedIn page. Management of the CBS Social Media accounts (LinkedIn, Twitter) has been delegated to student representative Neda Latifi.
- New terms of reference were developed for the IUS-BSE nomination process.
- Amanda Clifford (UBC) was appointed as CBS Secretary, and Thomas Willett is announced as the new Treasurer.

4. Financial Report (Thomas Willett)

- Tom presents account balances from October 2021, as well as report from accountant for CBS fiscal year (January December 2021). The CBS was profitable due to an amazing year on the market.
- The tentative balance sheet for operational year revealed a significant amount was spent on the website and logo this year in addition to typical expenditures. Real revenue is generated from any profit the meeting generates as well as 2021 memberships. In general, our expenditures almost double revenue.
- Tom shares that to deal with the deficit highlighted on the previous slide, money from the CBS chequing account was spent. He remarks that despite this, the society is in pretty good financial shape overall.
- The CBS has a mandate to spend down 2016 WBC legacy funds, however, zero was spent on WBC2016 Legacy Postdoctoral Experience Award this year because the BoD is working on restructuring this award.
- Looking towards the future, the market is changing, and an ROI of 15.7% is not guaranteed. As such, Tom proposes raising our very low yearly membership frees to balance the ratio between revenue and expenditures.
- Ze Zhang asks what our investment strategy is, and if the CBS uses a financial consultant.
- Tom answers that the money is invested in a mutual fund managed by a professional group at RBC.
- Paul Santerre suggests that the CBS moves to a 3-year running budget (since the President-Elect, President, and Past-President all serve on the BoD for three years at a time) rather than a yearly budget. Kim Woodhouse shares she would support this decision.

5. Awards Update (Thomas Willett)

- Tom shares that no WBC2016 Legacy PDF Experience awards were given out this year, since the BoD is in the process of restructuring this award.
- Two individuals won a CBS Visiting Scholar award this year: Sabrine Messaoudi and Sumaiya Karim. Tom offers his congratulations to both!
- Tom presents a table of Travel awards administered for CBS 2022 meeting: WBC2016 Legacy Travel, and CBS Merit & Travel awards.

• Sophie Lerouge asks how the amount for the travel awards was calculated, and Tom answers that these values were calculated by a committee consisting of Tom, Kibret, Eli, and Houman, based on a combination of abstract scores and distance (looking at Air Canada and West Jet ticket prices).

6. Website Modernization and New Logo (Kyla Sask)

- Kyla shares that there was vote for the logo online, but it was decided we will vote on the logo now at the AGM instead, due to low voter turnout online.
- Kyla gives an overview of the logo re-design process/process taken to obtain new logo. Important factors that were considered during the design process were the ability for the logo to be read in English and French, as well as higher resolution.
- Kyla communicates that the logo redesign process started with receiving potential options from designer of the original logo, but ultimately didn't move forward with any of their designs. The communications committee then explored options from three other graphic designers, selected the best, and went through five design rounds with the final designer (for a total of 15 different logo options).
- Feedback was received from the broader CBS membership through online poll, which helped refine the final design.
- Kyla moves to approve the logo, and Tom seconds the motion.
- Rizhi Wang asks what the story behind the logo is, why blue and orange were selected as the primary colours.
- Kyla answers that the way the letters are written, the logo can be read in English and French (e.g. CBS or SCB). The maple leaf represents Canada, while the blue is from the Quebec flag, and orange represents the indigenous people of Canada. The communications committee and BoD also looked at incorporating a scaffold motif, but couldn't reach consensus, so we came back to something simpler.
- Tom and Kyla summarize to the membership that re-designing the logo was a long process, in which as many opinions as possible were included to obtain something that was a little more modern and high resolution, and in the end it came down to trusting a professional to come up with something.
- The motion is passed, with the majority in attendance both in-person (49 votes), and online (11 votes) voting in favour, with 3 voting against (online), and 3 (in person) abstaining from the vote and 2 (online).
- Kyla shares that the website has an updated look, but it is an ongoing process to improve functionalities. Improved functionality will be achieved by a new taskforce lead by BoD member Brendan Leung.
- The communications committee released a newsletter in Spring 2022. One of the articles in the newsletter was in collaboration with the Australasian Society for Biomaterials and Tissue Engineering
- Tom thanks Kyla for doing an excellent job leading the communications committee and great work with the website and logo update

7. CBS Mentorship Programs (Thomas Willett and Gad Sabbatier)

- Tom reveals a new mentorship program to connect undergraduate students with grad student mentors across the country was launched this year. 43 mentors, 50 and mentees, 7 institutions across Canada are involved, and they have held a few professional development seminars as part of the program.
- Gad provides an update on the second mentorship program supported by the CBS, which matches graduate students with industrial/government employee mentors, professional development (to gain transferrable skills), career training (to strategize post-graduate job search) and networking opportunities(informal meetings with recruiters and industry professionals). This program connects employees from 27 companies, with graduate students from 11 universities across Canada.
- New aspects of the program include a development summer school in collaboration with start up companies, as well as an international research collaboration with CRIEVAT (ULaval), University de Lille, and Bernard Gregory Association.
- Tom shares that he had the privilege of attending the graduation ceremony of this program in August 2021, and it was really incredible to hear how the mentees were benefitting from the mentorship they were receiving.

8. IUS-BSE Representatives Report (Lauren Flynn)

- Lauren provides an update: the last meeting of all the delegates was held March 12th, with another meeting coming up on June 8th.
- A memo of understanding has been developed between TERMIS and IUS-BSE, to coordinate timing of world congress to minimize overlap between TERMIS (every 3 years) and WBC (every 4 years), as well as seek and organize events at each others' meetings through mutual promotion for regional societies.
- The IUS-BSE webpage, which is currently based in China, is being transferred to new page based in the USA.
- WBC 2024 will be held May 26-31st in Exco, Daegu, South Korea. It will primarily be an in-person meeting, with a hybrid option as a back up.
- Professional conference organization will be finalized in April, and program planning is currently underway.
- The IUS-BSE is creating a working group to set up official guidelines for selecting future WBC locations. Historically, this process has not been very well formalized, so the IUS-BSE aims to create formalized structures so people know how to put together a strong bid and what is expected. This working group will consist of 5-6 members representing various societies round the world. We were given opportunity to nominate a Canadian member, and Diego Mantovani has been nominated.

9. Reports of Student Chapters (Student Chapter Presidents)

- BC (Ruchi Sharm)
 - o In the past year, the BC Student Chapter has grown by over 50 members. They have also expanded their executive team.

- o They held their first monthly seminar after COVID on translational innovation. Dr. Stephanie Willerth and Tara Mathur presented, and there were 50 attendees.
- The BC Student Chapter aims to continue their monthly seminars, as well as host a UVIC/UBC networking luncheon at UVic, and BC Student Symposium in September.

• Alberta (Michelle Lan)

- o Michelle briefly introduced executive team, and shared chapter goals and mission.
- o The Alberta Student Chapter received \$3,000 in funding from the University Hospital Foundation to host the student night at CBS 2022.
- o They also held many events, including: "Biomaterials Against COVID-19" seminar, two biomaterials imaging competitions, guest lectures from Dr. Jianyu Li (McGill) and Dr. Conny Lin (industry), undergraduate mentorship program (recruitment and matching), and the CBS 2022 student activity night.

• Southwestern Ontario (Hossein Golzar)

- o Hossein briefly introduced the executive committee and vision for the next year
- o They held one event: a webinar from Prof. Hoare on hydrogel and soft material technologies (from lab to product)
- o The chapter has three future webinars and job fair planned for the next year

• Toronto (Kenny Kimmins)

- o In January 2022 Toronto chapter was incorporated
- O Their inaugural event was held in March 2022: a symposium with one speaker from each university in Toronto that also included an industry panel discussion. 127 participants registered, with 80 participants at peak attendance.
- o The Toronto chapter has social events, professional development seminars, and a spotlight talk planned for the rest of their first year.

• Ottawa (Mahdieh Heydarigoojani)

- o The Ottawa Student Chapter is currently in its second term of running the undergraduate mentorship program. Following their successful experience last year, graduate students helped undergraduate students with their application for graduate school.
- They also held a biomaterials and regenerative medicine conference in March 2022, and 3MT competition during a 2-day seminar
- o Their 2022 Biomaterials challenge asked graduate students how they would explain how to select a biomaterial or what is biocompatibility to a 7th grade student?

• Montreal (Valid Karamzadeh)

- o An election was organized, and new members joined the chapter
- o They also participated in CBS mentorship program, and started hosting in-person seminars again, such as "Tips and tricks on getting an academic position after graduation" by Prof. Savoji and Moraes in April 2022.

- Quebec City (Valentina Cumino)
 - Over a dozen monthly seminars and workshops were held throughout the year
 - o Either research or experience in industry was shared (e.g. commercial product development)
 - o Recruited for mentorship program and recruited mentors for mentees from other chapters
 - o Upcoming events include Wine & Cheese night, to facilitate networking for students and young professionals in collaboration with CHU in Quebec for public events on regenerative medicine and raise awareness of biomedical research.

10. CBS 2023 Update (Mark Filiaggi)

- The 2023 CBS meeting will take place in Halifax, NS from June 14th-17th. The meeting will take place on Dalhousie Campus, and will have quite a few options for accommodations. Dalhousie has recently built new residences that contain 3, 4, and 5-bedroom units, as well as hotels and AirBnBs. There will be an emphasis on making industrial connections, and events pre- and post- conference to allow participants to take in Halifax.
- The organizing committee consists of Mark Filiaggi, Brendan Leung, Daniel Boyd (Dal), and Marya Ahmed (UPEI). The committee still needs to recruit a student member.
- Emilio Alarcon asks Mark if the meeting will be fully in-person or hybrid? Mark answers they are planning for in-person.

11. Transition to New President (Thomas Willett and Eli Sone)

- Tom thanks the 2021-2022 BoD members for their service, Todd Hoare for managing the website, and Larry and the conference organizing committee for planning the 2022 meeting. He says he is looking forward to working with Eli and the new board.
- Tom welcomes Eli Sone as the new president.
- Eli says he is pleased and honoured to be taking over. He thanks Tom for his strong and capable leadership this year. Eli thanks Larry and his team for putting the conference together under incredibly challenging conditions, and remarks how nice it is to be together again.

12. Overview of Next Year's Initiatives (Eli Sone)

- Eli presents the objectives of his presidency. These include:
 - Sustaining the society's strength in supporting trainees (student chapters, mentorship programs, restructuring of underutilized awards – Eli encouraged trainees to look at awards available, as well as provide feedback on current awards).
 - O Continuing work to revise and update biomaterials.ca. Tremendous amount of work has gone into front end of website, but it is clear more work to be done to iron out glitches. As a professional society need a website that presents the face to the world that we want to present. To address this challenge, a website

taskforce has been created, chaired by Brendan Leung. Improvements to the website will support organizers of Halifax 2023, so they can focus on organizing conference.

- o Building a strong Canadian presence at WBC2024.
- o Continuing work to ensure fiscal sustainability of the society.

13. WBC 2024 (Eli Sone)

• Eli Shares key dates for WBC 2024, and encouraged members to submit symposia/workshop. He also recommended trainees lobby their PIs to determine what kind of work needs to get done to be sent to this conference.

14. Vote to approve 1-year continuation of Brendan Leung on the BoD (Eli Sone)

- The CBS BoD currently has five positions elected senior BoD members, with four seats coming up for election this year, the current BoD felt it was important to facilitate as much continuity as possible, and if the term of one of our board members is extended by one year, this would achieve that. The BoD unaninmously proposed that Brendan Leung's term be extended, since he is on the organizing committee for Halifax 2023 and is chairing the website task force.
- Eli moves to extend Brendan Leung's term by one year, and Tom seconds the motion. The motion is passed unanimously in-person, with an additional 7 votes in favour of the motion online. In-person, Brendan Leung abstained from the vote. No members abstained from the vote or voted in opposition online.

15. Nominations and Elections (Eli Sone)

- Eli Sone presented to the membership that three Senior BoD positions will be opening because Kyla Sask's, Houman Savoji's, and Isabelle Catelas' terms are coming to an end. The following members are nominated, in addition to the nominees that were nominated via e-mail that Eli presented on a slide:
 - o Jianyu Li is nominated by Jayachandran Kizhakkedathu. Rizhi Wang seconds the nomination. Jianyu accepts the nomination.
 - o Argyha Paul is nominated by Kibret Mequanint. Aishik Chakraborty seconds the nomination. Argyha accepts the nomination.
 - o Marta Cerrutti is nominated by Sophie Lerouge. Paul Santerre seconds the nomination. Marta accepts the nomination.
 - o Kyla Sask is nominated by Isabelle Catelas. Kyla declines the nomination.
- Eli Sone informed the membership that a Student BoD position will be vacant because Neda Latifi's term is coming to an end. No further nominees were nominated outside of the nominations Eli received via e-mail and presented on a slide.
- Eli Sone will request 250-word statements from the nominees prior to the elections for the senior and student BoD positions to complete the nomination process.
- In terms of nominations for President-Elect, Eli shares he has received two nominations thus far. Eli shares the names of the nominees on a slide, and that he has not received

a seconder for Milica Radisic yet, or heard back if she accepts the nomination. Paul Santerre seconds her nomination. The following members were also nominated:

- o Marta Cerruti is nominated by Lauren Flynn. Kyla Sask seconds the nomination. Marta accepts the nomination.
- o Lauren Flynn is nominated by Kim Woodhouse. Stephanie Willerth seconds the nomination. Lauren declines the nomination.
- o Marc Gautier is nominated by Paul Santerre. Thomas Willett seconds the nomination. Marc is not present at the meeting, so Eli says he will follow up with Marc via e-mail to determine if he accepts the nomination.
- o Isabelle Catelas is nominated by Brendan Leung. Emilio Alarcon seconds the nomination. Isabelle accepts the nomination.
- With no further nominations received, nominations for the 2022-2023 election cycle closed.

16. Adjournment (Eli Sone)

• Eli moves to adjourn the meeting. The motion is seconded by Mark Filiaggi. The motion is passed unanimously in-person at 2:32pm.
